Ever wonder what you're contributing to Missouri's transportation funding?

The Missouri Department of Transportation (MoDOT) has now made it easy to calculate exactly what your yearly contribution is by creating the "Citizen's Guide to Transportation" on the MoDOT website.

By taking the number of miles you drive in Missouri in a year and figuring it with your car's miles per gallon, asking you whether you use diesel and whether or not you purchased a new car in the last year the site figures up a total contribution to Missouri's transportation fund.

The guide breaks down how transportation is funded, where the money is going, high priority needs, current conditions of the state roadways and what the real cost is to Missourians.

In 2016, Missouri was considered the 7th largest state highway system in the U.S., but ranked 47th nationally in revenue received per mile, according to the MoDOT website.

The monthly cost to maintain Missouri's roadway system per driver was calculated to be \$169.00. An average driver pays about \$30.00 a month toward transportation. This makes it difficult to fund new transportation projects while maintaining current bridges and state roadways.

Hillhouse appointed to serve on Missouri Highways and Transportation Commission

Gov. Jay Nixon appointed Ed Hillhouse, a republican from Villa Ridge, to the Missouri Highways and Transportation Commission (MHTC) on Dec. 2.

Hillhouse was the executive director of East-West Gateway Council of Governments from 2010 to 2015, the presiding commissioner of Franklin County from 2003 to 2010, superintendent of Meramec Valley School District in Pacific from 1988 to 2002 and is now serving as Dean of the Franklin County Regional Learning Center of Missouri Baptist University.

**TAC decides regional transportation priorities
Highways 63 and 50 remain at top of list**

The Meramec Region's Transportation Advisory Committee (TAC) decided the expansions of Highways 63 and 50 to four-lane corridors remain the number one and two regional transportation priorities, respectively, at its December meeting. The proposed projects on Highway 63 and Highway 50 have topped the regional priority list for several years.

Once it was decided these two projects should continue to be top priorities for the region, TAC members from each county shared the top three additional transportation needs for their counties. The TAC then voted to prioritize these additional needs on a regional level. The prioritized list was approved later in the evening by the Meramec Regional Planning Commission (MRPC) board and will now be shared with the Missouri Department of Transportation (MoDOT) Central District office for consideration in MoDOT's Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP). The STIP is a five-year plan for design and construction projects.

In addition to the projects on Highways 63 and 50, other items topping the TAC's priority list, in order of priority, are:

- Addressing safety concerns at the Gasconade County R-2 school entrances and Owensville industrial park entrance from the Highway 28 junction to north city limits on Hwy 19 in Owensville;
- Replacement of the one-lane bridge over Little Bourbeuse River on Route C in Crawford County;
- Improving traffic flow on Highway 63 in Rolla from University Drive to the Interstate 44 overpass;
- Safety improvements at the intersections of MO 19 and Roosevelt St. and MO 19 and Franklin St. in Salem;
- Replacement of bridge over Dry Creek on MO 49 in Crawford County;
- Safety improvements at intersection of MO 133 and US 63 in Osage County near Westphalia;
- Asphalt county road approaches along the state highways in Maries County;
- Adding shoulders and addressing alignment concerns on MO 68 from the Phelps County Line to Route 19 in Dent County;
- Capacity and safety improvements at the Hwy V/I-44 north interchange near Rolla in Phelps County; and

The MHTC is a six-member board (confirmed by the Missouri Senate) that governs the Missouri Department of Transportation (MoDOT). It has authority over all state transportation programs and facilities including bridges, highways, aviation, railroads, public transportation, ports and waterborne commerce.

Hillhouse's term ends March 1, 2017.

- Replacement of the bridge over Fourche A Renault Creek on Route AA in Washington County.

The priority list is an annual planning exercise for the TAC.

Also during the evening, the TAC reviewed a list of high severity accident locations and prioritized those for consideration for road safety audits.

The TAC also heard presentations from six cities in the Meramec Region – Belle, Potosi, St. James, Waynesville, Rolla and Salem – on sidewalk improvements through MoDOT's Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP).

The top three, as ranked by the TAC, are:

- Replacement of sidewalks along Johnson Avenue to make the connection between the school and proposed Rock Island Trail in Belle;
- Sidewalk and accessibility connections between school, community center and park in Salem; and
- Accessibility and connectivity improvements to sidewalks and shoulders on Historic Route 66 in Waynesville.

The projects are among some 23 requests in MoDOT's 18-county central district.

Speed limit lowered on Route 19 in Swiss

In an effort to increase safety on Missouri Route 19 in Swiss, the speed limit has been lowered from 55 mph to 45 mph. The lower speed limit is in effect between Routes N and F.

Signs noting the speed limit change have been installed, and a speed trailer alerting drivers to their speeds will be stationed in the area for a limited time after the first of the year.

The Missouri Department of Transportation reviewed the speed limit on Route 19 at the request of local law enforcement, first responders and elected officials and agreed the speed limit should be reduced.

"We are hopeful the lower speed limit will make traveling on this stretch of Route 19 safer," said MoDOT Central District Engineer David Silvester.

Speed limit increasing on Highway 68

The Missouri Department of Transportation (MoDOT) made the decision to increase the speed limit on Highway 68 from St. James to Vichy to 60 miles per hour (mph).

Both Maries County and Phelps County Commissions requested a speed study be conducted after recent improvements to the highway were completed, which included widening the road and installing new rumble strips.

"We thereafter conducted a thorough analysis of the roadway to determine what the most appropriate speed limit should be and concluded that the speed limit could be raised to 60 mph (currently 55 mph) without any adverse impacts," MoDOT Meramec Area Engineer Preston Kramer said in an email. "We've ordered the signs and hope to have them in and installed before spring of 2017."

MoDOT ran the idea by the Missouri State Highway Patrol and they agreed that the 5 mph increase would be appropriate.

Citizens in rural areas had virtually no role in the development of the transportation plans affecting their community. That changed with the Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act of 1991 (ISTEA), and its 1998 successor, the Transportation Equity Act for the 21st Century (TEA 21). These acts require that long range transportation planning includes statewide public, private and governmental input—meaningful input—from the grass roots level which will be considered and used in the development of transportation plans. That same effort has continued with SAFETEA-LU - The Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Safety Act: A Legacy of Users - in 2005 and MAP-21 - Moving ahead for Progress - in 2012.
